- Work Health and Safety Bill 2019 introduced into parliament on 27 November 2019
- Bill has passed the lower house and is being considered by the committee in the upper house
- Public consultation on draft Regulations closed on 26 November 2019



- Concept of PCBU
- Primary duty to ensure health and safety



Cost

Available means to mitigate risk Likelihood of risk


Consequences of risk

Knowledge of risk (knows or ought reasonably to know) and means of mitigation





 Health defined to include psychological health





 Duty to not put the health and safety of others at risk arising from work carried out by the PCBU



- Officer's due diligence
 - Knowledge
 - Understanding
 - Resources
 - Analysis and response
 - Compliance
 - Auditing



- Duty to consult with workers
- Duty to consult with other duty holders
- Increase in HSR powers
- Enforceable undertakings



- Industrial Manslaughter
 - Crime 20 years jail + \$5 million (individual) or \$10 million (body corporate)
 - Simple offence 10 years jail + \$2.5 million (individual) or \$5 million (body corporate)
 - Officers can be charged



- Insurance and indemnities for fines void
- Offence to try and obtain such coverage
- Can still insure legal costs
- Need to take steps now to ensure compliance




- Psychosocial
 - Prohibition notices to individuals to stop conduct
 - Improvement notices requiring risk assessment and controls
 - Improvement notices requiring investigations
 - Clear need to focus on psychosocial matters as being safety issues



- Human Factors
 - investigate the human factors involved in an incident
 - identifying 'human error' or 'complacency' is not enough







- Technology
 - Interest in incidents involving automated equipment
 - Designer duties
 - Loss of understanding of risks



Other jurisdictions

- Directors jailed for breaches of WHS legislation
- Industrial manslaughter charges issued
- Trend is for regulators to exercise more statutory powers
